


To further master her craft, Maria earned a third Masters, most recently in Mathematics and trained with the Center for Math and Science at LMU. She has used her outstanding educational background to not only coach fellow teachers but, more importantly, to take a deep dive into mathematics teaching and learning. Maria describes herself as someone who works to discover the patterns that make up the world of mathematics. She promotes this same thinking with her students asking them to see themselves as part of a world filled with math as opposed to viewing themselves as human calculators. Through her teaching, Maria has learned to study connections and the progression of a topic across a number of grade levels. In turn she has developed an in-depth understanding of the standards, how they connect, and their implications in

classrooms. She works with teachers and students to create engaging and powerful lessons that explore the “why” behind math concepts. As a result, Maria’s positive rapport with her students and peers speaks to her focus on the individual as she works to help create opportunities for middle school students to witness the beauty of “mathematics” in discovering the patterns that make up the world of mathematics. When asked about being a finalist for the PAEMST, Maria said, "I don't feel like I did anything out of the ordinary and if I am getting the recognition it is because of the amazing students that have truly blessed my life and have pushed me to be better everyday."


Wiseburn Students Achieve at High Levels

2018–19 Overall Achievement - Grade 8



The Wiseburn Unified School District made notable gains in all areas of learning as revealed in recent CAASPP State testing results for the 2018-2019 school year. This past year, WUSD students grades 3-8 far surpassed State averages by 24 pts in English Language Arts and 21 pts in Mathematics. More importantly, our K-8 programs show an aligned model of continuous growth culminating in 8th grade where students’ proficiency in both Mathematics and English Language Arts reveal an uptick in proficiency scores. This past year, Dana Middle School graduating 8th graders outpaced local districts in both tested academic areas with a proficiency rate of 84% in English Language Arts and 65% in Mathematics. The chart above compares 8th grade outcomes for all schools in LA County with Wiseburn’s students. In Wiseburn, students graduate from 8th grade prepared for their next challenges and opportunities that come with attending outstanding schools such as the DaVinci High Schools. While CAASPP State testing results are just one means of measuring student outcomes, our best and more telling results are always in the day to day learning that takes place in all of our TK-8 classrooms. Wiseburn Budget

As we have officially closed the books on the 2018-19 school year, we wanted to be transparent by highlighting the fiscal strength of the General Fund for the last six years. As you can see in the chart below, the District and the Governing Board have made it a priority to maintain the fiscal strength of the District's General Fund. Out of the last six years, the District has operated a balanced budget with revenues slightly outpacing total expenditures. By operating a balanced budget, the District is able to offer a high quality educational program that is sustainable over time. Please note, the figures provided do not include any one-time revenues or one-time expenses as the figures provided are the District's "true" operating structure. In 2014-15, the District experienced approximately \$500K in unexpected Measure CL revenue as a lawsuit over Measure CL was found to be in the District's favor, contributing to the large surplus.

The District is also pleased to announce that in August, Moody's Investor Services upgraded the District's credit rating from an Aa3 to an Aa2. There is only one higher credit rating, Aa1. This upgrade to the District's credit rating will save our taxpayers on any future bonds issued or bonds refinanced due to lower interest rates and also exempts the District from paying insurance costs on bonds issued.

Lastly, the District held oversight committee meetings for Measure A and Measure CL on October 7. Staff detailed annual revenue and expenses for the 2018-2019 fiscal year. An update on the current high school construction project was provided as well as an update on the 2019-2020 Measure CL budget. The next oversight committee meetings are scheduled for Monday, April 20, 2020.

District Professional Development Day

Each year WUSD educators take time to increase their own learning to best support students in all aspects of their education. November's District Professional Learning day offered varied experiences for teachers across the district. Our elementary teachers focused on the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS) to further investigate the

structure of the NGSS Performance Expectations, the role of phenomena, and to reflect on the instructional implications State science assessments have for teaching and learning. In collaboration with the Wiseburn C.A.R.E. team, early elementary teachers focused on positive behavior supports and incorporating practices that encourage the development of empathy and self-regulation in our students. Middle school teachers spent this day of learning exploring their work as a Professional Learning Community tied to the school's 2019-2020 goals. In addition, our preschool special and general educators were provided with strategies to improve peer interactions, language development, and pro-social behaviors in preschool students. Special education instructional assistants were provided with training to support instructional strategies to assist special needs students in the general education environment. Professional learning opportunities in Wiseburn support the extraordinary work of our staff who engage in learning together for the benefit of their students.





Hello Wiseburn Family! Members of the CARE Team have been enjoying unique activities over the last month. Alongside Wiseburn staff members, we participated in the Alive and Running 5K Run/Walk for Suicide Prevention. During this event, we remembered loved ones lost to suicide while raising funds and awareness for the Didi Hirsch Suicide Prevention Center. In the month of October, we also promoted National Communicate with Your Kids Month, Bullying Prevention Week, Mental Illness Awareness Week, and Red Ribbon Week. For each of these celebratory times, we provided information to parents through each elementary school's newsletter including tips on how to start meaningful conversations with children, suggestions for providing support with bullying prevention at home, and talking points about drug prevention. We also collaborated with our principals to help support events at school such as assemblies and spirit-wear days. Finally, for Mental Illness Awareness Week, we highlighted information about how teachers and staff members can take care of themselves and know when and how to help others. We are happy that we have been able to participate in community events and lessons at the school sites to help support the positive learning environment for all of our kids. We look forward to another busy month ahead!
